Social media presence entails risks. The type of information published on social media has been successfully utilised for intelligence purposes. By relying on this information, intelligence operators have been able to expose activity or information that should have been kept under the radar. However, it is unrealistic to expect that people stop their social media consumption even when in exceptional conditions. Thus, it makes sense to learn to recognise and manage the risks involved.

Your social media account affects the public image of the Finnish Defence Forces. On your own personal social media account, you may mention that you work or serve in the Finnish Defence Forces. And, even when you refrain from pointing this out, it may often be deducted based on your activity. The public behavior of people who serve in the FDF contributes to the public image of the FDF. You are able to affect what this image looks like.

You get to choose how you use your own social media accounts. Sustaining personal social media accounts is not a service task. You get to decide as to which social media services you register for, or whether to opt out altogether.

Social media are not something detached from this reality. Everybody remains responsible for their own actions and effects thereof both online and in real life. The legislation in force governs all behavior, and so does the code for appropriate and polite behavior. Inappropriate activity on social media may result in consequences also in real life, including criminal liability procedures.
